The KH1 Baker Island DXpedition came up on schedule and seemed to be very successful even though the team was limited to using only vertical antennas. Most of our club members were able to work them for a new one on the bands and modes that they wanted.

Here is Yvette, AE5MI, who seems to be very happy, having just worked them on 20 meters CW. (First call, 30 watts to 4 elements at 55 feet.)

Even with the current poor conditions there are a couple of contests coming up this month that may be of interest to some. First is the North America QSO party, CW, on $4^{th} / 5^{th}$ August. This is not really a DX contest, but it is a good opportunity for operators who want to practice their CW skills. An interesting feature is that the exchange is your name and state only, and there sure are some people with very curious names out there! Makes it fun.

On the 11th / 12th August is the Worked All Europe contest, CW. This is one of the contests where additional points can be scored for sending or receiving QTC's. Recommended for experienced CW ops only!

Now, on the 19th August there is the SARL (South Africa) contest. It is intended mainly for South African stations, but it is a digital contest that includes FT8, so if you need South Africa for a new country or digital contact this may be worth looking at. Information at:
