September $29^{th} - 30^{th}$ sees the CQ Worldwide RTTY contest taking place. This is usually a very busy one with many countries represented. It has a "rookie' category and also a "classic operator" category. The "classic operator" category is for stations operating only one radio as distinct from the stations operating two or more radios. A pet peeve of mine is that one radio stations in contests are often included with SO2R stations in the results which, in my opinion, is totally unfair.

The Oceania SSB contest is on October $6^{th} - 7^{th}$ and the Oceania CW contest is the $13^{th} - 14^{th}$ of October. Good contests to pick up some of the South Pacific islands, possibly on 160 meters. K5GDX has a history of doing well in the CW contest.

October 20th – 21st will be the JARTS (Japanese) RTTY contest, also usually plenty of JA's on the air.

It is a big DX Engineering vertical complete with ground mounting pipe and winch to raise it from the horizontal to the vertical position. It will replace the existing 80 meter vertical and utilize the existing ground radial system. Very many thanks George for this great donation.

As soon as the weather cools off we will need a devoted group of members to aid with installation. If you have never installed a vertical antenna this is will be an excellent learning opportunity!

We now have DX Dinner tickets on sale, and tickets for the raffle, which will be drawn during the DX Dinner event on 1st December at the Great Southern Club. Our speaker during the evening will be Bob Allphin, K4UEE, who was a member of the 2018 Bouvet Island DXpedition team and has taken part in very many exotic operations.
